

#LiveYourWild during South African National Parks Week 2018

From Monday, 10 September until Friday, 14 September 2018, South Africans are invited to visit the 19 South African National Parks (SANParks) across the country for free, to experience what the parks have to offer. Conceived in South Africa in 2006, the week-long #LiveYourWild campaign, in partnership with Total South Afriand FNB, is to familiarise and create awareness of the national parks and an understanding of environmental conservation amongst South African citizens.

This year, in the lead-up to Parks Week, SANParks conducted a road trip to five national parks in collaboration with Total South Africa, DSTV and Cars.co.za.
